Yance Ford Producer, Writer, Artist



Yance Ford is an artist working in film based in New York City.

His debut film Strong Island won a Sundance Film Festival Special Jury Prize and the Gotham Award for Best Documentary and the Black Film Critics Circle Award for Best Doc.

Strong Island was nominated for Best Documentary Feature at the 90th Academy Awards, where Ford made history as the first openly transgender director nominated for the Oscar.

Strong Island won the Primetime Emmy for Exceptional Merit in Documentary Filmmaking.

Ford is also a former Series Producer of the PBS documentary series POV. His curatorial work there was recognized with 5 Emmy Awards and 16 Emmy nominations.

Ford is a MacDowell fellow, a member of the Sundance Institute Collective and was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship in 2019.

Long Island Patriot's Award Winner

Dr. Roy Aranda

Doctor of Psychology and Community Advocate



Dr. Roy Aranda obtained a Doctor of Psychology degree (Psy.D.) from the Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology, Rutgers University, in 1982, a 2-year Post-Doctoral degree in Neuropsychology in 2001, and a Juris Doctorate (J.D.) in 2007. He has been licensed in the State of NY since 1983 and is President of Long Island Psychological Consulting, P.C. He performed hundreds of forensic evaluations and was an expert in several high profile cases including the Happy Land Trial (Cuban immigrant who killed 87 people) and the New York Terrorist Trial (blind cleric Sheikh Omar Abdel Rahman and several coconspirators). Dr. Aranda traveled extensively and made many presentations in the U.S. and abroad. He has written several articles throughout his career. Dr. Aranda served as President of New York State Psychological Association (NYSPA) in 2016 and is a Distinguished Fellow. He is Cochair of NYSPA's Disaster Resource Network. He is President of the Association of Hispanic Mental Health Professionals, a Past President of NYSPA's Forensic Division, and a Past President of Queens Psychological Association. He served as President of the Long Island Hispanic Bar Association and President of the Hispanic Neuropsychological Society. Dr. Aranda has received many awards including: Allen V. Williams Jr. Award, New York State Psychological Association's highest honor given for sustained service to the profession,

on June 3, 2017; Hispanic Healthcare Advocate of the Year Award by Presiding Officer Norma L. Gonsalves and the Nassau County Legislature at the 3rd Annual Legislative Hispanic Heritage Month Celebration on October 12, 2017; inducted as a Fellow into the Psychology Academy of NAP (National Academies of Practice) as a Distinguished Practitioner on April 14, 2018; New York State Psychological New Distinguished Practitioner & Fellow on April 14, 2018; New York State Psychological Association's prestigious Beacon Award on June 2, 2018: award given occasionally to a psychologist whose leadership and/or advocacy activities have established a guiding light for the profession of psychology; Honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award at the Sixth Annual NAACP Long Island Legacy Gala on January 18, 2020 at the Melville Marriott Long Island; recipient of Rutgers University Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology Alumni Association Organization Award for Distinguished Career Achievement on September 13, 2020. This award recognizes GSAPP alumni who have distinguished themselves by contributions they have made in their chosen fields of endeavor, by the leadership they have exhibited, and by the general benefits to the larger society resulting from their activities. Dr. Aranda organized the Third Annual Death & Dying Conference on December 13, 2020 and the Fourth Annual Annual Death & Dying Conference is scheduled for March 21, 2021. He has sought to empower society through several fundraisers and the Dr. Roy Aranda TV Show on TribunaTV that since August 30, 2018 has focused on many topics of interest to the Community geared to educate and empower viewers that included racial violence and discrimination, LGBTQ, Black Lives Matter, Hispanics who face social injustices, children separated from parents at the border, children and immigrants locked up at the border. ICE raids, minorities exposed to greater COVID contamination, minorities exposed to more dangerous situations, less pay, and no health benefits at work, 9/11 survivors suffering years later from serious medical illnesses struggling to obtain the care they need, the plight of Dreamers, many COVID-19 health and traumarelated issues, and the social and civil unrest that permeates the country, etc. Here is the link: https://www.tribunatv.us/category/videos-on-demand/roy-aranda/

Long Island Legacy Award Winner

Honorable Errol Toulon Suffolk County Sheriff



Errol Toulon, Jr. has 30 years of criminal-justice experience, heavily centered upon corrections intelligence and combating gang violence both inside and outside of correctional facilities.

His criminal justice experience commenced with 22 years as a uniformed Member of Service with the New York City Correction Department, where he served as a supervisor and instructor at the Correction Academy, the Firearms and Tactics Unit, Emergency Service Unit and Office of Compliance Consultants.

Errol then spent two years serving the constituents of Suffolk County as the Assistant Deputy County Executive for Public Safety under the

administration of County Executive Steve Bellone, where he supervised eight public-safety departments, including the Suffolk County Police Department and the Department of Fire, Rescue, and Emergency services, as well as the Medical Examiner's Office.

In July of 2014, Errol was named Deputy Commissioner of Operations for the New York City Correction Department. During his two and a half year tenure as Deputy Commissioner, he oversaw the Applicant Investigation Unit, Training Academy, Correction Intelligence Bureau, Emergency Preparedness and the Policy and Procedures Unit.

Errol is certified through the Department of Homeland Security in Emergency Planning, Radiological Emergency Management, Incident Response to Terrorist Bombing, WMD Threat and Risk Assessment and State Disaster Management. In addition, Dr. Toulon is certified to teach Weapons of Mass Destruction Awareness, NIMS, Domestic Terrorism and Hate Crimes. He received his Master's degree in Business Administration from Dowling College, an Advanced Certificate in Homeland Security Management from Long Island University, recently completed his Doctorate in Educational Administration and attended leadership courses at JFK School of Government at Harvard University.

Errol is a two time cancer survivor recovering from lymphoma as well as pancreatic cancer. His battles with cancer have inspired him to further dedicate his life to helping others.

Brittaney Antoine

Black Lives Matter Movement Protest Organizer



Brittaney Antoine is a class of 2007 Brentwood Alumni. Ms. Antione attended Suffolk and Broward Community Colleges where she focused on an Associate's degree in Social Work.

In the Summer of 2020, Ms. Antoine became a board member for Uplift Our Towns, Inc., a grassroots organization that strives to support the Brentwood and adjoining communities by inspiring active community engagement and participation. Since her membership,

Ms. Antione has assisted in reaching and providing for over 153 children in the Brentwood, Central Islip and Bay Shore areas.

Ms. Antione is a community advocate and activist who has participated in multiple protests including the national 57th Annual March on Washington.

Ms. Antione has also assisted in the coordination and planning of local protests such as the "Say Their Names" protest for George Floyd and the "March for Justice" in Brentwood and Central Islip. Currently,

Ms. Antoine works for the Brentwood Union Free School District and is the Secretary for the Local 237 Union, which supports the non-instructional employees in the Brentwood Union Free School District.

Ms. Antoine has also participated in the NAACP Back to School Rally for the past 8 years.

Dr. Alan Singer College Professor, Researcher and Human Rights Advocate

Alan Singer is a social studies educator and historian in the Department of Teaching, Learning and Technology at Hofstra University, Long Island, New York.

He is a former New York City high school teacher and regularly blogs on *Daily Kos* and other sites on educational and political issues.

Dr. Singer is a graduate of the City College of New York and has a Ph.D. in American history from Rutgers University. He is the author of *Education Flashpoints* (Routledge, 2014), *Teaching to Learn, Learning to Teach: A Handbook for Secondary School Teachers, 2nd edition* (Routledge, 2013), *Social Studies For Secondary Schools, 4th Edition* (Routledge, 2014), *Teaching Global History* (Routledge, 2011), *New York and Slavery, Time to Teach the Truth* (SUNY, 2008), and *New York's Grand Emanci-*

He is the editor of a curriculum package about the Civil Rights Movement on Long Island, was a participating historian in "Defining Moments: The Civil Rights Movement in North Hempstead" and is the coauthor of *Supporting Civics Education with Student Activism* (Routledge, 2020). He has been a civil rights activist in the New York metropolitan area since the 1960s.

Long Island Legacy Award Winner

Joysetta Pearse

Curator and Historian



Joysetta Pearse was born in 1938 in Brooklyn, NY. She became interested in genealogy after attending a lecture given by Dr. James Rose, the first person to receive a PhD in Genealogy. Joysetta knew she wanted to investigate her own family, particularly her grandparents. Her grandfather was Irish, and her grandmother was African American. Her grandfather was disowned by his family when he married her grandmother, so Joysetta wished to know more about them.

Joysetta's grandfather's father, Daniel Mooney, was born in County Terrone, Cookstown in Derrylawn Parish in Ireland.

Joysetta's grandmother, (Martha) Etta Mooney, was an orphan: she grew up in Canarsie before moving to Weeksville and Atlantic Avenue. Etta's mother died when she was eight and her father died shortly thereafter. Her father had worked on the railroad, but could sing as well. She had a brother and a sister, but after her parents died she was taken in as a scullery maid by a foster family. Joysetta remembers her grandmother telling her about waking up at 5:30 in the morning to do chores for her foster family. When she was 13, Etta Mooney started to sing in church, as well as sing the blues. She was one of the first female blues singers to be recorded: in 1921, she worked for Harry Pace who owned Black Swan Records in Astoria, NY. Recordings of hers that survive include "Early Monday Morning Blues" and "Hoochie Coochie".

Long Island Legacy Hward Post Humous

Barbara Dunmore Ford Lifelong Educator and Community Advocate



Barbara Dunmore Ford was born and raised in Charleston, South Carolina the beloved daughter of the late George and Earline Dunmore. She married her grade-school sweetheart, William Ford, in 1965, moving with him to Brooklyn, New York, to begin a prominent and accomplished career as an educational innovator. Mrs. Ford began her career with New York City Public School System as an English Teacher.

Some thirty-three years later she had served as Assistant Principal and Principal of Brooklyn's Thomas Jefferson High School and the Founding Principal of Rosewood High School, a school for adjudicated women and girls that is housed on Rikers Island.

Her career was accented with the design and implementation of numerous instructional programs that have supported the development of the children and greater educational community of Central Islip.

Of noteworthy mention is her service as Deputy Parks Commissioner for the Town of Islip where she over-

saw the renovation of the fields and courts of the Central Islip Recreation Center. Mrs. Ford earned her Bachelor of Arts degree at Benedict College in Charleston, South Carolina and a Master of Science degree and a Professional Diploma in Education Administration and Supervision at Long Island University C.W. Post College.

Mrs. Ford was a valued member of the Central Islip community. A resident since 1972, she was an active participant in many organizations of which there are too numerous to name. Dear to her heart, however, were her positions as Usher, Hope Missionary Baptist Church; Board Member, Central Islip Civic Council; and Co-Founder, Central Islip Coalition of Good Neighbors.
